FINANCIAL LITERACY

Starting with the students anticipated to graduate in 2028, it is mandated that individuals must successfully finish a personal financial responsibility course before being eligible for graduation. The legislation establishes specific content requirements for the course and dictates that public schools, charter schools, or state-accredited nonpublic schools must incorporate instruction on this course as a distinct subject.

- O Analyze a business situation or principle through the use of a case study.
